What an honour

John Gibbons of St Helens has been awarded the People's Choice RHS 2024 Harlow Carr medal in recognition of his significant contribution to horticulture in the North of England.

He was awarded the medal through length of service, commitment to projects and his unique capabilities combined with his reliability and professionalism.

John started working at Pilkington at the age of 21, after completing three years'service in the RAF. He worked in St Helens in Rolled Plate. He then became a Training Officer in glass manufacture and then a Foreman before retiring at the age of 58.

His father in law, Edgar Chisnall, who also worked for Pilkington as a chemist in Head Office, introduced John to growing and showing geraniums (pelargoniums).

John showed his plants at National Shows, winning many prizes, but his main interest became hybridisation. John has created over 100 new varieties with 60 of them forming part of the National Pelargonium collection which is now held by the Royal Horticultural Society over various sites. Whilst most of his plants were given the prefix

'Bold' after the parish he lives in, he named several after his family, including his father in law Edgar. He named one after Lady Mavis Pilkington who visited him on several occasions accompanied by her gardener. He also named one Willowbrook after the Hospice in St Helens.

This was never a business to John, he never gained financially, what was a hobby became a passion.

As treasurer of the Geranium Society he arranged two National Shows in St Helens. He travelled around the North West giving lectures on hybridisation.

John's family are incredibly proud of the award. John was unfortunately unable to attend the award ceremony in Westminster due to illness. But his daughter Carol and granddaughter Katie attended on his behalf and they presented him with his medal on his 90th birthday.



...and long distance runner Paul

Paul Bond, beneficiary from Doncaster, followed his father John Bond into the Pilkington Factory in Kirk Sandall, Doncaster, and worked there from 1977 until 1999. He was employed on the production line in what was known as No 9.



Paul was never really interested in long distance running at school or in his younger days, saying that he preferred football.

It was in the late 1980s whilst working at Pilkington. that Paul started to run for enjoyment. Initially he ran alone as it was never his intention to race competitively.

However, Paul's first competitive run was in the early 1990s, where he took part in a local nine-mile race in Doncaster after being convinced to take part by a work colleague, Keith Temperton.

Paul says that he completed that run in 63 minutes. This is where he got the bug for competitive running after he realised that he was running at a decent standard and producing good race times. Paul then joined his local Athletics club at Askern before joining Doncaster & Stainforth Athletics Club in 1999. The

club later re-allocated to the sports complex at the Keepmoat Stadium (now called the Eco Power Stadium, the current home of Doncaster Rovers FC). It was this facility that allowed Paul to improve, as he now had access to a state-of-the-art running track.

Fellow members of this running club were Pilkington employees Keith Temperton and Andy Hall. Paul still attends his athletic club for track sessions and group runs, twice a week, but runs on his own almost every day, covering

distances between six and 15 miles per session.

Another school friend and ex-Pilkington work colleague, Dale Collins, then inspired Paul to compete in marathons.


Paul has competed and finished the London Marathon three times and has also competed in the Paris, Prague, Cyprus, Ireland, Spain and the Channel Islands marathons plus the great North Run in Newcastle.

Paul picks and chooses the races in which he decides to run. They are usually every six to eight weeks. He now competes in the Veteran's 60 – 64-year-old category.

In 2022, Paul won his category in the Withernsea 5-mile event, the Epworth 10K and has also won the Bridlington 5k event.

In 2023 he won Silver in the South Yorkshire Road league - a five-mile event, which takes place between March and June. He has also finished 2nd in the Hardwick (Nottinghamshire) 5-mile event and in September won the Cleethorpes 60 - 64-year-old event. He came 2nd in the Scarborough 10k in October.

After Paul left Pilkington, he became a police officer, joining the British Transport Police in 2002 and serving until 2014. Ironically Paul worked alongside Wayne Pikett who is now the Regional Welfare Officer for the Family Trust in Yorkshire and Humberside!

A. I would ask the whole organisation to keep supporting each other. Never lose sight of what we are here to do.

O. What are your plans for retirement?

A. My plans for retirement are to volunteer at an animal charity and spend more time with my mum who is turning 90! Also, to enjoy life.



Mini strokes not just 'funny turn'

Those who ignore symptoms of a TIA (transient ischaemic attack) or ministroke, are running the risk of having a major stroke, the Stroke Association warns.

TIA causes similar symptoms to a stroke, such as speech problems, but may last only a few minutes. A survey of TIA patients found more than one in three had dismissed their symptoms as just a 'funny turn'.

About 10,000 strokes could be prevented if TIAs were treated, said the charity.

Omega is a registered charity dedicated to reducing social isolation and loneliness.

Proposal for a new Day Centre and Dementia Hub

The Trust currently operates a day centre at Ruskin Lodge, catering for adults, including those diagnosed with dementia. This centre plays a crucial role for beneficiaries by offering meaningful activities, promoting independence, and providing essential respite for caregivers.

Due to growing demand, the Trust is considering the establishment of a Day Centre/Dementia Hub. This new facility would be located on the Ruskin Welfare Leisure Centre site in Dentons Green (pictured) approximately one mile northwest of St Helens town centre. The area boasts a mix of residential and commercial spaces, with various local amenities nearby.

Dementia-Friendly Environment: The physical space will be thoughtfully designed for maximum accessibility and comfort. A modern facility, it will prioritise safety and relaxation, minimizing stress and anxiety often experienced by those seeking dementia support.

Social Space Café: The Hub will include a welcoming café, a place for people to connect, share experiences, and build relationships. Peer support will play a vital role, allowing attendees to help one another.

Community Options: Beyond the structured programmes, the Hub will offer various community options. Individuals who are more independent can participate in additional activities tailored to their preferences.

The proposed Day Centre represents a significant step toward enhancing the lives of individuals living with dementia and their caregivers.
